DISSERTATION BOOT CAMP

WHAT IT IS...

The Dissertation Boot Camp provides doctoral students an opportunity to make serious progress on their dissertations or other doctoral writing projects (e.g., prospectus). The Boot Camp offers a distraction-free environment with peer support and writing consultants on-site. Students will show up—ready to write—both days. We will provide a quiet, comfortable space and keep everyone supplied with pens and pencils, post-its, notepads, coffee, light refreshments, and lunch (on Monday). During the stretch and lunch breaks, we will introduce you to helpful writing, organization, and revision strategies. We will also provide optional one-on-one consultations with trained, experience writing consultants to answer questions and to offer general writing support.

WHAT TO BRING & WHAT TO EXPECT...

Bring your writing materials (books, research, notebooks, etc.) and your laptop. We'll have tables for you to spread out on. We'll get each day started with an opportunity to get to know one another, to set (and share) personal goals, and to generally boost your confidence in your ability to make progress during the Boot Camp (and beyond). Students are expected to write for the entire duration (with some stretch breaks, of course) of each session, must show up both days, and stay for the entirety of the Boot Camp. We'll be around to keep supplies stocked and to solve technical problems. Writing consultants will also be available for one-on-one consultations if you need them.

THE RULES

You've got to be willing to "check out" for the day (with the exception of breaks, of course). No email. No FaceBook. No social media. No texting. No phone calls. There will be no talking during the writing periods. (Consultations will take place outside of the writing space.) You must be ready to write. No researching; this is really about writing. And, most importantly, you must commit to staying for the entirety of the day-and-a-half event.



Unemployment rates and earnings by educational attainment, 2017







Graduate Application Requirements




- Online Application
- \$25/\$35 Application Fee
- Transcripts from all colleges/universities attended*
- Three Letters of Reference*
- Proof of English Proficiency

Only required if your undergraduate or previous graduate degree was not earned at an institution with primary instruction in English from an accredited institution in the United States, Australia, Canada, Ireland, New Zealand, and/or the United Kingdom.

- Other items that may be required depending upon the individual graduate program:
 - Official Entrance Exam Scores (e.g., GRE, GMAT, PRAXIS)
 - Statement of Purpose
 - Resume or CV
 - Writing Sample / Portfolio
 - Evidence of professional licensure



^{*} If applying for a graduate certificate, Master's +30, or entrée program, this item may not be required.
