
What are Peer Mentors?

Peer mentors are current sophomores and above who are paired with a faculty member and are assigned to a section of UNIV 100 (First-Year Seminar). This large student organization is run for the students and by the students.

What is UNIV 100?

UNIV 100 is a class for first-year students. This class is a three credit hour seminar that helps students transition successfully from high school to university life and academic work. The course has two components: (1) Cajun Connection, which is an extended introduction to UL Lafayette, to the campus community, and to University-level work and (2) the First-Year Seminar, which then continues for fifteen weeks.
