Goal/Objective	Students will acquire research proficiency in anthropological methods of data collection, analysis, application, and interpretation. Proficiency in anthropological field methods is associated with achieving applied research skills in the social sciences, including cross-cultural analysis and interpretation, anthropological linguistics, human biological variation and evolution, and understanding the temporal and spatial dimensions of the human condition. Students will attain competence in skills and techniques of data collection, analysis, application, and interpretation. Student access and participation will be facilitated through Forensic Anthropology (ANTH430), Biorachaeology (ANTH435), Heritage and Habitat (ANTH465), Cultural Resource Management (ANTH 480G), the Archaeology Field School (ANTH 490G), Research in Cultural Anthropology (ANTH491G), Archaeological Records (ANTH 499G), and through internships or independent studies (ANTH 497 and 498: Special Projects).		
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Goal/Objective	<p>Faculty and students will strive to raise awareness of the discipline of anthropology and increase visibility of the anthropology program through education, communication, and interaction within the university and with surrounding community. As the study of human biological and cultural variation, both in the past and present, anthropology is uniquely positioned to advance understanding of the human condition. Issues such as cultural relativism, cross-cultural "universals," cultural sustainability, human rights and indigenous survival, fundamentalism, racial, ethnic and gender discrimination, violence, and conflict resolution are studied and systematically addressed through anthropological research. Increased awareness of anthropology is associated with more comprehensive and insightful knowledge of humanity and what it means to be human.</p> <p>Several plans have been implemented to fulfil this goal. First, Introduction to Anthropology (ANTH100) was added to the curriculum to provide non-majors with an overview of cultural, linguistic, biological and archaeological sub-fields, including human variation, evolution, race, language, civilization, and cultural diversity, thus raising their awareness of anthropology and anthropological thinking. Second, Cultural Anthropology (ANTH201) is being offered as a hybrid course to provide an alternative learning style and encourage enrollment in anthropology courses. Third, a Topics in Anthropology (ANTH320) course was added to the curriculum to allow for alternative topics related to current events or student interests, to draw in more non-majors and increase their awareness of anthropology and anthropological thinking. 4) What were the measurable or perceivable effects on your current (2016-2017) findings based on prior action plans (created in 2015-2016)?

Enrollment in Anthropology courses has increased overall. In Fall and Spring 15-16 enrollment totaled 767. In 16-17 enrollment totaled 886. The number of majors is staying steady/rising slowly it is not falling. The Anthropology Society had increased participation from 2015 to 2017.

5) What has the unit learned from the current assessment cycle?

Our recruitment and advertising efforts are having a positive impact. Our efforts to improve research, writing, and hands-on (methodological) opportunities are showing positive results. There were significant changes in the faculty 3 years ago and in therefore the mentality of the program. These changes have had small but positive impacts to date. The program feels this positive trend will not only continue but increase in magnitude. We plan to continue evaluating our efforts to identify those methods that are most effective and beneficial to the students and the program as a whole.
